



# What Happens on a Training Day?



Inset days (Training Days) were introduced in 1988 under a Conservative

government by the minister then responsible, Kenneth Baker, as part of a series of reforms, including the introduction of the National Curriculum. They were originally, and are still occasionally, referred to as Baker Days, because Kenneth Baker introduced the requirement for teachers to attend training in addition to the 190 days previously required.

So what really happens on a training day? Here is a look at what went on during the March training day.

Collaborating for Success or C4S as it's more commonly known started 6 years ago and is now where six North Yorkshire secondary schools train and work together on a specific theme aimed at developing learning and teaching. This year's theme was 'Aim High'.

This year St Aidan's School in Harrogate for Teaching Staff and King James's School Knaresborough for Support Staff were the hosts. The keynote speaker was Baroness Tanni Grey-Thompson who is one of Britain's most successful

Paralympic athletes. The focus of the speech was to explore the day's theme 'Aim High' in which she discussed the challenges she faced as a young girl and her determination to break through the barriers and low expectations that society had for her. She also discussed what personal success really means and reflected on the transition through various stages of her career, from sport,

to politics and as a campaigner for improved access to physical activity, trying to mobilise the most physically inactive generation of young people.

Following a short break, staff could then attend a break-out speaker's session led by a specialist professional on one of the following: Focused Thinking, Practising what we Preach, Metacognition and Mindset. The afternoon is focused on collaboration in subject areas through subject network workshops. Evaluation forms are filled in at the end of the day, so improvements or amendments/additions can be made ready for future days.

Training days are extremely beneficial for all staff especially the collaborative days.

Meeting with other colleagues, learning new teaching practices and working together to help with continued professional development (CPD) are invaluable for all staff.

#### **Shared Reading experience**

To celebrate World Book Day all KS3 and KS4 students were asked to fill in a book review sheet. This was based on their favourite book, fiction or non-fiction that they have read and would recommend to others. The emphasis was on drawing attention to these books so the illustration on the review is as important as the information they wrote. KS4 students are all reading GCSE Literature texts and KS3 are involved in Independent reading projects and have regular library lessons so they all had a book to use for the project. Students were then asked to create a display of these, preferably on their form room door. The best display received chocolates and 25 house points. It was hoped that students would see the importance of literature, and that we can all share the joy of a good read together, thus presenting our reading culture clearly and without compromise.

This is one of the most prestigious swimming competitions in the calendar as it is a qualifying gala for European Championships. Although the swimmers were competing in the junior competition they were swimming alongside such champions as James Guy, Adam Peaty and Freya Anderson. The event was compered by Rebecca Adlington.

Abby competed in the 50m free and was the 3rd fastest 14 year old on the day, which was no mean feat considering the level of competition.

Tom was competing in 50m and 100m free, 50 and 100m fly and 50m back. As well as achieving some fantastic new Personal best

times he qualified for the Junior 50m final finishing 7th overall. This was an amazing result and the highlight of his career so far.
