Dear Parents and Students,

On 1 May the STAR Multi-Academy Trust (MAT) came into being. This was the culmination of a great deal of work over the last two years and one that we hope will strengthen the existing strong partnership between our 10 schools even further. So what are the benefits?

Our schools want to determine their own futures, rather than being 'done to'. The education landscape is fast becoming one where academy trusts are becoming the 'norm' and the capacity of Local Authorities to drive school improvement is diminishing. The culture of our trust is very much one where schools will retain their own distinctiveness but also benefit through collaboration. TGS is a very successful and unique place and by joining this trust we aim to keep it that way!

We want our students to achieve even better outcomes and for all of our schools to become outstanding. We will continue to build and secure local school improvement capacity, and shared development strategies, which will help us do this by providing appropriate levels of challenge and support within the partnership. We are building on strong relationships and high levels of trust.

We are near enough to each other to build a strong local partnership, building greater community cohesion, and more shared activities across all of our schools, benefiting students as well as our staff. These will include shared approaches to curriculum planning, teaching and learning and potentially opportunities to share specialist roles across more than one school. **Together we want to provide greater opportunities for recruiting new staff**, to retain our existing staff, facilitate leadership development and enhance staff professional development.

At a time of reduced funding in schools, our formal partnership can more easily achieve 'better value' and financial stability by having more efficient central and shared services and enabling individual schools within the partnership to focus more resources on teaching, learning and pupil/student support. As a MAT of over 3000 pupils and students, and 10 schools, we will have access to the School Condition Allocation (SCA) which will enable us to access significant capital funding for our school buildings.

We will support – and challenge – each other through effective governance and accountability at local level. As good and outstanding schools working together in an already strong Teaching School Alliance, we are very well-placed to achieve this.

As a consequence of the formation of the trust I will be taking on the role of Chief Education Officer (CEO) for the next year or so as we grow and develop our partnership. From 4 June Mrs Wendy Wilson will be taking the role of Head of School and will lead and manage the school on a day to day basis; I wish her the very best for her new role. I will be based at TGS and will continue to be closely involved with the continued growth and development of the school.

Four students have directly beaten over 8,300 other school teams, an estimated 35,000 students, to be crowned 2018 Student Investor Champions.



'Benoit's Barmy Army,' consisting of sixth formers, James Tucker, Harry Bean, Alex Robinson and James Bradshaw triumphed in a demanding final against six other teams, where they outperformed the market in several live trading simulations, before delivering a professional presentation giving financial advice on both the risk and return on a range of financial assets and commodities from crypto currencies to investing in gold. The team have won an all-expense paid trip to New York where they will visit the New York Stock exchange, Wall Street and other world renowned sites. Law Ambassador Programme

Y12 Students have been lucky to attend the Law Ambassador programme that runs at BPP University Law School in Leeds. The law and business school is currently reaching out to existing School partnerships to look at other ways that they can support students and give them an insight into a possible career in Law, Accountancy or Business. The University offers a variety of tutor led career based workshops that they can run at school - lasting from an hour to an entire day. The workshops give students a practical insight into the professions and a better idea of what it takes to be a lawyer or accountant. All the tutors are qualified solicitors, barristers or accountants. In the next academic year, the Law School is looking to pilot a new 'Law ambassador' programme. Aimed at students with a particular interest in Law, this two year programme provides a timetable of Law based workshops and experiences.



Change Makers



The Children's Media Conference is the most important event in the UK for everyone involved in developing, producing and distributing content for

children. Delegates from television, radio, film, games, interactive media, magazine and book publishing, the licensing and toy sectors and the arts and culture sectors and our very own Ambassador for TGS Jemima Browning will be attending. CMC 2018 runs in July where 1,200 delegates converge on Sheffield, UK for keynotes and over 60 sessions.

Jemima has been invited as part of her Diana Legacy Award programme to speak at the national Children's Media Conference as one of the key "change makers". She will be making a speech and joining a panel in the style of Question Time. Acclaimed Poet, broadcaster, YouTube star, children's advocate and former Children's Laureate Michael Rosen will deliver the CMC 2018 Opening Keynote.

Proposed Autism Centre

At Tadcaster Grammar School we are trying



to seize an opportunity to create a safe learning

environment for children

who may need a totally bespoke curriculum (or modified provision if they are able to access the full mainstream curriculum) but also benefit from being with children from the community in their local school. We are trying to renovate an old dilapidated building on the school site into an Autism Base in order to meet the growing needs of young people with ASC who attend TGS.

We are hoping to landscape the garden area, add a perimeter fence and create a covered area for outside learning (whatever the weather) where children can learn, play and communicate safely. We are also hoping to acquire a sunken trampoline to help selfregulation. We want to put in a kitchen so that children can complete vocational learning/AQA awards. We want the children to be able to bake and cook with future plans to hold 'Open Café' days to the public community.

A sensory room is also planned along with 'fit for purpose' classrooms etc. The upstairs space is wonderful but currently not accessible, due to fire regulations; hence an outdoor staircase is being looked at. Ultimately we want to be able to meet the requirements of children with more complex needs so that they can attend a local school. We do not have a cost for the project as we hope to rely heavily on volunteers and donations <u>...read more >></u>

Dream Experience

As part of my work experience, I visited a friend of my parents who lives in Paris and teaches English in a middle school (Year 7-Year 10) called Collège Françoise Seligmann. I spent 4 days in the school helping out with the students and assisting in their English lessons. I showed them pictures of TGS and also told them about myself which was helpful for the Year 7s especially, as they were studying how to describe someone. When I wasn't in an English lesson, I was lucky enough to sit in some other lessons including French, Geography and History, so I got a real feel for the way the subjects are taught in France. This was a great help with my French and understanding the similarities and differences in the way subjects are taught. I found it really interesting to sit in these lessons, because it was different yet very similar to how it is here in England.

When I wasn't in school I was out exploring all the wonderful sights Paris has to offer. I don't think there was a part of Paris that I didn't explore! I climbed the Eiffel Tower- which was truly incredible, visited the Mona Lisa in the Musée du Louvre, saw the Arc de Triomphe, walked through Buttes- Chaumont park and strolled down Avenue Montaigne- famous for all of its designer shops.

I was so lucky to have spent a week in such an incredible city and school.

I have been able to create links and pen pals between our school and Collège Françoise Seligmann. It's been an amazing experience because not only did I get to learn about the French schooling system and help out with classes, but I also got to explore a wonderful city and be able to speak French, surrounded by the native people and culture. *By Poppy Wilson Y12*
