The variety of food on offer was superb, catering for all dietary requirements, with hot and cold food, and a well-stocked salad bar; which was not only used by the staff! There was over 65 acres of space, and the facilities on offer were superb; with a sports hall, football pitch and playing field, superb food hall and shop. All the leaders were really kind and always encouraged us to go ahead and do the activities. Personally I enjoyed all of the high rope activities, like climbing or vertical challenge, but I know quite a lot of people who would prefer to have their feet planted firmly on the ground! Oglethorpe and Dawson Educational Foundation

The Oglethorpe and Dawson Educational Foundation uses the money left by the founders of Tadcaster Grammar School to assist the training of students of the school and to prepare them for future careers; also to give special benefits to the school of a kind not provided by the local authority.

In 1557 Owen Oglethorpe, Bishop of Carlisle, obtained Letters Patent (a Royal Warrant) from Queen Mary to found a Grammar School in Tadcaster. In his Will, Owen left property (acquired from former monastic lands) to endow the school and gave instructions about its buildings and curriculum.

Henrietta Marshall was born in Tadcaster in 1727. Following marriage to one Mr Dawson, she moved away and did not return to her home town. In her Will of 1795 she left an endowment to provide a school for girls and to support poor women in the town. For more than a century the two schools remained as separate institutions supported by the Founders' endowments until, in 1906, they were amalgamated as Tadcaster Grammar School. The money to support the school initially came partly from the Founders' endowments and partly from fees paid by parents although, over time, financial support increasingly came from the local authority, at the time West Riding County Council.

After the Second World War, the local authority took full responsibility for supporting the school, leaving the Founders' endowments as a separate fund. The Oglethorpe & Dawson Educational Foundation is the body which administers this fund.

The Governors use income from the assets of the Endowment for making grants for various locally-related educational requirements, both in Tadcaster and its surrounding parishes:

Prizes for School Celebration Evenings and House Awards;

• The provision of items such as additional library books, computers and other IT-related equipment and other departmental requirements not supported by central grants, whatever the source;

• Support for individual students to assist in special circumstances, including out of school activities such as field trips and other visits supporting the curriculum as well as cultural, sporting and life - enhancing activities.

In all cases, grants are made because of the financial circumstances of the student; the grant never covering the full cost but, rather, being a limited contribution.

The most recent example of support for the school has been in support of the Just 'B' Bereavement Support initiative, not least the provision of a counselling service to support those students requiring assistance over and above that normally available though the school. This initiative has just completed its second year and is now embedded in the school's operation.

Congratulations

We have had the privilege of welcoming Leeds Faith in Schools in both KS3 and KS4 lessons. This is the first time a Church group has visited Tadcaster to spread some Christmas cheer and impart specialist knowledge.

Twenty Five years ago, the churches in Leeds came together in response to the Faith in Leeds report to establish Leeds Faith in Schools to share the Good News with teenagers across the city. From working with a handful of schools in the beginning they now have youth workers working across approximately 15 high schools and academies in Leeds. "We hope to be good news to the high schools of Leeds whom we serve by delivering Assemblies, RE lessons, PSCHE lessons and mentoring groups as well as running lunchtime clubs, Christian Unions, after school activities and sports coaching. Our work is values-led and contributes to schools' SMSC responsibilities. During Year 7 and Year 8 lessons students

learnt about the importance of Christmas and the gifts that Jesus received at his birth- Gold, Frankincense and Myrrh. The lesson is also themed on the game show 5 Gold Rings. Students need to complete quiz rounds to locate key pictures- such as the star at the top of the Christmas tree and words in song lyrics. The pressure was on to get the gold ring in the correct place! Students who managed this received a chocolate as their prize. At the end of the lesson all students received a 'mini present' to hang on their Christmas tree, to remember their day with Leeds Faith in Schools.'



Year 11 Triple Scientists have had two sessions, one on mission and evangelism and one on the persecuted Church. The sessions directly match the GSCE exam specification. During these sessions, students have time to reflect upon others who are not in the same fortunate position as themselves. Also how people throughout history have been persecuted for their beliefs and how people of faith help to care for others. Mobile Phones in School

Just a quick reminder for parents about the rules regarding mobile phones in

school. We understand that you will want your child to have a mobile phone with them when they are in school, especially when you factor in that some of the transport providers issue e-tickets and our students can be travelling for quite some time to and from school. However we have very clear rules about phones in school. Phones must be switched off and in school bags other than when they need to be taken out on the bus park at the end of the day. Very occasionally, staff may allow students to use the technology on their phones, such as the camera or the calculator, but this is only at the teacher's instruction and under supervision.

If you need to contact your child during the school day we would ask that you ring the school; this is vital if you believe your child is unwell. We have had occasions when a child has used their phone to contact their parents to inform them they are not well and the school has been unaware. If a student is found to have their phone out around school it will be confiscated. If this happens on more than one occasion we would ask that a parent collects the phone. Students are aware that if they were to use their phone in an unsafe way in school, such as photographing or videoing fellow students, they run the risk of being issued further sanctions.

Uniform Reminder

We would like to recognise the large number of students who wear our school uniform with pride every day and look smart. However, as the term draws to a close and we approach the new year, we thought it important to flag up a few uniform reminders. During the winter can we ask you as parents, to encourage your children to wear a school coat and remind you that hoodies, sweatshirts and zip up sports tops cannot be worn as a substitute for a coat; even if your child insists that they can. These items will be confiscated.

Similarly, when it comes to footwear, we expect students to be wearing school shoes - any trainers, including black trainers with or without a logo, are not to be worn. When it comes to jewellery, just a reminder that no facial piercings are allowed and students are only allowed to wear one pair of silver or gold studs in their ears.

Finally, following on from the letter about the new school uniform, we encourage students to move into the new uniform by September 2020 from this point Chalks will not be able to stock the legacy uniform.

Exam certificates are lifelong documents and once collected should be kept in a safe, memorable place. Replacement certificates are only available from the Exam Boards.

Sport England Training programme



Tadcaster Grammar School is pleased to be part of phase 2 of the Secondary Teacher Training Programme funded by Sport England. Sport England are investing £13.5million of National Lottery funding into a Secondary Teacher Training programme designed to provide teachers with access to professional development, as well as

put students' enjoyment and whole-school outcomes at the heart of PE and school sport. While some youngsters have a great experience of PE and sport at school, others don't and the research shows that this can put them off being active for life. Lots of people have bad memories of being picked last for a team, or just feeling really uncomfortable in PE lessons. This programme is designed to stop that happening. It will help schools and individual teachers design a wider range of opportunities to increase young peoples' enjoyment of sport and PE; which gives them a much better chance of being active in later life. It will do this by giving teachers the resources and training they need to engage all students in physical activity, regardless of sporting ability. So what has happened so far

Mr Solk, Head of Faculty: Physical Education, said "I am pleased to report that we have made some considerable progress already in such a small period of time. Students have completed a PE questionnaire which has provided valuable feedback regarding the PE experiences within and beyond the school. It has been re-assuring to see that the students believe they value PE and enjoy their experiences. Naturally, there is always room for improvement, whether it is with certain groups of students or with certain activities. It is our intention to use the small allocation of money from Sport England wisely to increase further a positive PE experience for as many students as possible so that they can lead healthy, active lives."

Game of Our Own

Three girls from Year 9 were selected to take part in the Game of Our Own workshop delivered by the Youth Sports Trust and the FA. This training, with a girls football focus, is aimed at increasing the participation of girls in football at Tadcaster Grammar School. The 3 girls are currently looking at ways they can do this.



The PE staff took part in the British Dodgeball Teachers Workshop to provide them with some key ideas in this emerging sport in schools. The aim is to introduce this inclusive sport at different times of the year(whether for participation or through to excellence) with an opportunity to enter the inaugural National Schools Championships in June 2020.

A note from the Head

What a fantastic term, and how quickly it has passed. Fifteen school weeks have simply flown by. I hope you enjoy reading this newsletter which gives a brief overview of some of the fantastic activities that have taken place since we started the term, in the sun, back in September.

One of the most satisfying elements of our work in school is hosting visitors during, and beyond, the working day. These include prospective parents and children, local headteachers and representatives from business and education. It is wonderful to hear their feedback about our school, all noting the calm purposeful learning environment, how polite and committed our students are and the overall friendliness of our community. It is also an absolute pleasure to walk the school daily and see our fantastic students engaging in their learning and contributing to our community. I recently escorted a visitor from another Academy Trust around the school and, as a typical snapshot of school life, we saw sixth formers forensically processing a crime scene, year 7s reviewing a baked product they had just made, year 8 practising elements of a core text on the tennis courts at full voice, an assembly led by students concerning equality and diversity, a key stage 4 practical Physics lesson, a rugby match on a very cold, frosty pitch and design work in art using the medium of clay. Wonderful! Thank you to all parents who recently engaged in the survey about relaunching the school vision and values statement. This was an exercise which canvassed the views of all students, parents, staff and governors about the need to recapture what the school represents, its values and expectations. The overwhelmingly popular statement following on from this research exercise was:

Be your best self, be: Ambitious; Resilient; Responsible; Respectful to yourself and others.

The full version of the school vision and values statement, is published on the school website.

I mentioned in the October 2019 newsletter that home-school communication and reporting to parents are areas we have under review. The school moved to a new on-line management system in September and we continue to work to allow parents access to information about their children which will keep you up to date about attendance, progress and behaviour for learning.

It would take several pages to recount and describe all of the fantastic co-curricular activities that have taken place this term. These really do add to the vibrancy and quality of our 7-year school experience and have included, to mention only a very few, sporting events, a wonderful school production, foreign travel, guest speakers, cultural visits and residentials at home and abroad. I'd like to thank parents for their support of these activities, as well as all the teachers and associate staff who give their time so freely to organise and staff them.

Student leadership has also been a strong feature this term. It is very inspiring to see students of all ages actively engaging with activities which contribute to school life and offer opportunities to develop leadership and management skills. Of particular note are the house student leadership teams and form reps, the student parliament, our equality and diversity group (recently re-awarded Stonewall accreditation) and the ECO group which is making significant progress with the school sustainability agenda.

It is a time to regroup and reflect upon the work over the last term and to look forward to the challenges and opportunities which 2020 will bring. For example, Year 11 have recently received their mock examination results after working so brilliantly over a challenging 2-week exam period and many Year 13 students are now receiving university offers through the UCAS system. Life moves on so quickly and it's important that we are mindful and take time to reflect, celebrate and plan.

Whilst writing, may I offer another thank you to parents for your fantastic support of the school. Sometimes it's the small things that parents do to facilitate the bigger events which add so much to the school experience; from collecting together ingredients for a food technology lesson (sometimes I'm sure at the 11th hour after being informed on the evening prior to the day they are required!), delivering and collecting students to and from sporting events, ensuring school uniform meets standards, and your attendance at school events. I hope you feel a healthy confidence in the school and the work we do. Equally, if you feel the school has fallen short, that you feel your concerns are valued and responded to.

May I extend my very best wishes on behalf of the school to you all for the festive season and new year to come.
