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





CASE STUDY: Ultimate question- how do we determine if something is Good or Moral?







The girl in the picture has been arrested for shop lifting. Were her actions right or wrong?

IS IT RIGHT OR WRONG?

Becky is a sixteen year old girl. She left school with very few qualifications and has a six month old baby boy. Becky has very little money and finds it very hard to buy everything she needs. The special baby formula she needs is very expensive and she is always short of money. Whilst at the supermarket Becky steals some food she hopes that nobody will notice.

Different Philosophers will give different answers to this question.

Which Philosopher are you?!

If you said that stealing is always wrong you are taking an <u>absolute</u> moral position.

Things are always right or wrong. It doesn't matter about the circumstances.

You are Immanuel Kant and Thomas Aquinas.

- If you said that it depends on the situation, Becky was stealing food for her child to survive for example, you are taking a <u>relative</u> moral position. You look at each situation differently.
- You are Joseph Fletcher and a situationalist.





- If you like to ask ultimate questions and attempt to answer them
- If you like to argue your point in an analytical and evaluative way and develop critical thinking skills
- If you want to look at life from a deeper, more realist view
- If you want to greater sense of the world and study the great thinkers
- If you want to learn how to win in discussions!
