The symbols can be found in pottery and fabric designs and are made using a block printing technique. Created in France in 1982, it has been taken up by neighbouring countries where it has been just as successful. Music takes over the singers, amateur musicians, drummers, DJs and so on scattered throughout the cities, expressing themselves through music and inviting the crowd to enjoy themselves.

To mark this occasion schools are asked to take part in a French Pop Video Competition.

This year we had two entries for the competition . A great rock song from a Year 9 student called "la poète" and a beautiful ballad from Naomi in Year 12. The results will be published in June for "la Fête de la Musique", and feature in our Summer Newsletter.

Naomi tells us;

'I recently, entered the French Pop Video Competition by Institut français du Royaume-Uni. I sang a self-written song titled 'Ma Montagne' and made a video to accompany it. It is about the comfort of being in nature - in particular being in the mountains. Mountains provi<mark>de a different</mark> perspective on life: all the anxieties about daily life seem much smaller looking at them from a height. Nature has been my sanctuary and it's why I am so passionate about looking after the envir<mark>onment and</mark> engaging in mindful activities such as gardening. In my song, I personified the character of a mountain into a comforting, maternal being who could hug my troubles away. Tadcaster Grammar School returned to competitive athletic fixtures competing in the English Schools Athletic Cup. Three teams competed in the competition, Junior Girls,

Inter Girls and Inter Boys. For many students it was their first experience of athletics.

The outstanding performance of the day was by R Thistlewood who ran the 1500m. She not only won the event but broke the school record by 15 seconds to set a new Year 8 girls 1500m record of 4.57. A fantastic achievement.

The Inter Boys team finished fifth in the competition with notable performances from F Brown jumping 4.95m to finish 2nd in the Long Jump competition and a strong performance from S Brisland in the 800m to be the top scorer for the boys' team.

The Inter Girls finished second in the competition. This was a great team effort with all the girls supporting each other throughout the day. The top performer was A Moss

who competed in two technically difficult events, high jump and hurdles, to secure top three finishes in both events. J Neilson was another high scorer for the team having two good performances in both the Shot and 300m. The girls were delighted with the second place result.

The Junior Girls were the star performers on the day. They had so many outstanding performances and this was their first ever athletics competition for school, some had only had one athletics practice before the competition. This team has the potential to improve on their performances and I am looking forward to them competing throughout this season. E Hague was a high points scorer with a super 3 minute 800m. In the hurdlers, M Baker and H Mappleback secured top 2 positions in their first ever races. The team finished third overall.

Did you enjoy your time at school?

If I'm honest I didn't really enjoy my time at school. I enjoyed the social side of

What path did you take on leaving school?

Lifeguarding Courses

<u>Tadcaster Community Swimming Pool</u> will be running Lifeguarding courses over the summer holidays. You need to be 16 to attend the course.

The National Pool Lifeguard is a 6-day course, which covers a wide range of CPR, First aid and aquatic rescues. All NPLQ courses held at Tadcaster run with a full Emgerency First Aid at Work course and equip the Lifeguard to use an Automated External Defibrillator and Spinal Rescue board.

Funded places (90% of cost paid by TCS) are

available to those who have completed 50hrs of voluntary lifeguarding at Tadcaster pool.


