A day in the life of a Sixth Form student


- **Uniform** - Students should come dressed suitably for a working environment
- **Facilities** - Students have access to their own floor of the library, a Sixth form only computer room, the Sixth form common room, Sixth form canteen and Sixth form area of the field

- Please ensure we have the correct contact and medical information for your child




Overview of Summer Results 2022








Destinations





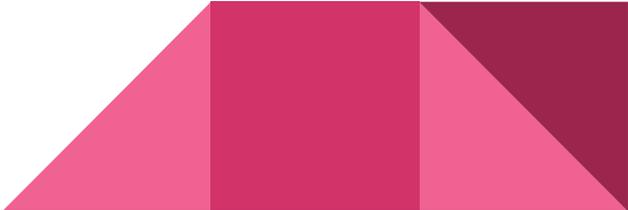
Independent Learning



Three elements...



How to study

1. **Get into a study routine** - It is easier to stay motivated if studying becomes part of everyday life and routine. Switch off phones and devices before starting
 2. **Effective Reading** - Reading for learning requires a conscious effort to make links, understand opinions, research and apply what a student learns to their studies. One of the most effective ways of actively engaging with reading is to make notes in your own words as you go along
 3. **Note Taking** - Regardless of how good you think your memory is - taking notes will help to remind a student what was said. Effective note-taking involves listening whilst jotting down key points that will be important later, not writing every single word down
 4. **Planning and writing an Essay** - The original meaning of an essay is 'an attempt', or a try, at something. It is therefore appropriate to consider writing an essay as a learning exercise. Essay writing skills will improve and develop the more a student writes. Making an essay plan before beginning and sort out what to include in the essay, the order and the clear points to be made
 5. **Reflecting on feedback and marked work** - The feedback received from the marker of the essay or assessments should help to advance a student's study skills, writing, research and critical thinking skills. Encourage students to ask if they are unsure of any of the feedback given.






Pastoral Support

- Support is available from Mrs Gadsby for Sixth Form Students with any issues they may be experiencing that are impacting on their day to day lives
- Advice can be provided on organisation, stress, time management and wellbeing at pressure points in the year as well as in the weekly Wellbeing Wednesday sessions
- Additional academic support is offered through the lifebelt process when needed
- Referrals to outside agencies can be made if necessary including the Just B Counselling service and the Wellbeing in Mind Team support available in school

16 - 19 Bursary Funding



What is the Bursary Fund?

The Government sets aside money for students **aged between 16 - 19** who are **attending Sixth Form** education and whose household income is **£28,000 or less**, are **entitled to Free School Meals** or are **young people in care, care leavers, young people receiving income support and disabled young people receiving both Employment Support Allowance and Disability Living Allowance.**


Did you know?

UCAS

Application overview

What is UCAS?



UCAS is an independent charity providing information, advice and admissions services.


UCAS does:

- provide information, advice, and support
- process applications
- complete fraud and verification checks
- take part in education sector engagement

UCAS doesn't:

- make decisions or offers
- set entry requirements
- advise on finance
- advise on immigration or visas for individuals

Completing the UCAS application



Student registers for a UCAS Hub account to carry out research and start application.



Student completes all sections of the application and sends it to their school/college.




Teacher or adviser reviews the application and adds reference and predicted grades.



Applications are sent to UCAS by the school or college on behalf of the student.



Universities and colleges make their decisions on the application.



When to apply for 2023 entry

UCAS Undergraduate application opens for 2023 entry.

UCAS application deadline for courses in medicine, veterinary medicine/science, and dentistry, and courses at Oxford or Cambridge.

UCAS Extra opens.

6 September

25 January

30 June

3 May

15 October

23 February

First day UCAS can receive a completed application to process.

UCAS equal consideration application deadline.


Last date for applications before Clearing opens.

Please note the dates above are the published UCAS deadline dates, TGS deadlines are set earlier - see Year 13 Key Dates for further details.

Applicants applying to conservatoires' must check the individual course websites for deadline information as it may be different from above.

Key facts

- To start an application a student needs a **UCAS Hub account**.
- From **3 May 2022** students are able 'Start' their application in UCAS Hub.
- They have up to **five choices**, unless applying to study medicine, veterinary, medicine/science, dentistry – then it's **four choices**.
- **Can't apply to BOTH** Oxford and Cambridge.
- Applying **costs** £22.50 for 1 choice, or £27 for multiple choices.
- Apply by the **equal consideration date**.
- Universities and colleges **can't see** other choices.
- TGS students should link their application to school using the '**buzzword**' - **Tadcaster23**
- Some courses and institutions require additional admissions tests to be taken alongside the UCAS application, these may have an separate registration and entry deadline. **It is the responsibility of the student to check and register for an admissions test. The deadline 29 September.**

The application form is organized into several main sections:

- Profile**
 - Personal details >** Name, age, title, and gender. Status: Section complete.
 - Contact & residency details >** Address, email, telephone, and where you live. Status: Start this section.
 - Nationality details >** Country and nationality details. Status: Start this section.
 - Supporting information >** Status: Section in progress.
 - English language skills >** Is English your first language? Status: Start this section.
 - Finance & funding >** Tell us how you'll fund your study. Status: Section in progress.
 - Diversity & inclusion >** Only shared with a provider once you have a place or your application is archived. Status: Start this section.
 - More about you >** Tell us about any circumstances that you might need support for during your studies. Status: Start this section.
- Experience**
 - Education >** Your qualifications and periods of study. Status: Section in progress.
 - Employment >** Employment, paid or unpaid, or volunteer work. Status: Section complete.
 - Extra activities >** Activities you have attended in preparation for higher education. Status: Start this section.
- Personal Statement**
 - Personal statement >** Why do you want to study this subject? Status: Start this section.

Tracking applications and offers

UCAS Hub is the place to check for:

- application updates
- view offers
- reply to offers online

One of three decisions will be made:

- unconditional offer
- conditional offer
- unsuccessful

Offer Deadlines:

- **18 May** if application sent by the 25 January 2023
- **12 July** if application sent by 30 June
- **End of October** if clearing application



Students will receive responses back at different times, as some institutions start to make offers earlier than others. In some cases, offer decision-making only starts after the UCAS application deadline has passed.


Replying to offers

Once decisions have been made on all choices, up to two can be chosen:

- one as a 'firm' acceptance – first choice
- the other as an 'insurance' acceptance. This acts as a backup to the 'firm' choice

Any remaining offers must be declined.

Once all decisions and replies have been made, students who are not holding an offer, may be able to use Extra or Clearing to find available places.


Open days

Attend virtual events and open days – you may have a different perspective.

Be proactive

Make sure they carefully read everything that is sent to them and don't book holidays at key times!

Personal Statement




Your child may find writing their personal statement the most difficult part of the application process – they're not alone!

For most applicants, it will be the first time they've had to write reflectively about themselves. Taking a positive approach, and leaving enough time to do a good job, really can make your child's application stand out from the crowd.

TIP A good personal statement:

- is relevant and focused – don't waste the 4,000 characters
- uses clear, plain English ▸ avoids clichés
- is original – UCAS' software scans all personal statements for plagiarism
- is redrafted multiple times until it's right




Open Days

It's pretty standard for students to take along one or both parents, or guardians, to an open day. Going to an open day is one of the best ways to help make well-informed decisions about where and what to study.

A successful open day trip is all about the preparation. Plan ahead by:

- Book, places are limited and pre-registration to attend is usually required.
- Make a rough plan for your day – check anything you need to in advance, eg accommodation tours, beware of talks to attend and taster lectures.
- Get in touch before the day, if you have any special requirements or disabilities.
- Drafting questions you need answers to.



Student Finance

While at university your child will have two main costs – tuition fees and living costs. They can apply for student finance to help with both.

All eligible students can get a:

- Tuition Fee Loan to cover the full cost of the fees charged by their university or college
- Maintenance Loan to help with living costs, such as rent and bills

Any loans they borrow have to be paid back, but not until they've finished or left their course, and their income is over the repayment threshold.

There are also grants available for students who have a disability, including a long-term health condition, mental health condition, or specific learning difficulty, or students who have an dependant who depends on them financially.

A student's university or college may also offer bursaries, scholarships, or other kinds of financial help.

Once your child has applied for student finance, that depends on your household income, you'll get an email within 24 hours with a link to submit your household income details.



